Dear parent, guardian and staff:

**RE: COVID-19 case at École Jean-Paul II**

This letter is to inform you that Public Health Sudbury & Districts has advised us that a confirmed case of COVID-19 has been reported in our school. The individual who tested positive for COVID-19 is currently self-isolating and being monitored by Public Health Sudbury & Districts while the investigation continues. All COVID-19 cases and contacts are currently being investigated and managed as per the enhanced provincial guidelines for the more transmissible variants of concern.

As this situation is under active investigation, please continue to check our school board website for updated information and should you have any questions regarding this information please call the École Jean-Paul II Principal at 705-897-4434. At the time of writing, the following additional class is dismissed effective immediately up until and including March 24, 2021:

**Grade 7A**

Public Health continues to investigate the situation and if any risks to the school community are identified, they may direct additional measures. The situation will be monitored closely, and we will provide timely updates on the Conseil scolaire catholique Nouvelon website.

Public Health Sudbury & Districts is working closely with our school to manage the case. They will directly contact all parents of children and all school personnel who have been identified as close contacts. If you are not called by Public Health Sudbury & Districts, please continue to follow the general advice in this letter.

In general, if your child is dismissed from school as part of this situation, but you are not contacted directly by Public Health, your child must [self-isolate](#) immediately until and including March 21, 2021.

- Your child should seek COVID-19 testing between March 17-19, 2021. In addition to this, if your child is symptomatic or becomes symptomatic at any time, they should seek testing as soon as possible.
- Even if your child receives a negative test result, they must remain home and self-isolate up until and including March 24, 2021.
- For the duration of your child's isolation period, everyone else in your household is required to stay home except for essential reasons. Essential reasons include: attending work/school/child care and essential errands such as groceries, attending medical appointments or picking up prescriptions.

- If your child develops even one [symptom](#) of COVID-19, everyone in your household is required to [self-isolate](#) until the child receives a negative test result or is provided an alternative diagnosis by a healthcare professional. If they are not tested or do not receive an alternate diagnosis, all members of your household must self-isolate as directed by Public Health. Please call 705.522.9200, ext. 524 if you develop any symptoms for additional direction
- The isolating individual must self-isolate away from other household members. Note that if the isolating individual is young and/or cannot isolate apart from other household members, one identified parent or caregiver must also isolate with the individual away from other household members.

These isolation dates may be extended based on our ongoing public health investigation.

In general, if your child is not dismissed from school as part of this case, the following applies:

- Simply passing by an infected person in the hallway is not considered close contact, and the risk of spreading the virus this way is extremely low.
- Continue to use the [COVID-19 Screening Tool for Children in School and Child Care](#) and <https://covid-19.ontario.ca/school-screening/> to monitor your child for symptoms and follow the direction provided.

Remember to follow the critical ongoing COVID-19 prevention measures:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water or alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Sneeze and cough into your sleeve.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth.
- Stay home and [isolate](#) if symptoms appear.
- Practice two-meter physical distancing.
- Wear a mask in indoor public spaces and outdoors, especially when physical distancing of two meters cannot be maintained.

It is understandable that this situation may make caregivers anxious and some will choose to keep their child at home as a precaution. Please advise the school if you choose to do this so that we may make arrangements for continued learning when possible.

As noted, Public Health Sudbury & Districts will directly contact all parents of children and staff who have been identified as close contacts.
